EVENTS HAPPENING AT VAN BUREN PARK

On Saturday, June 1st, over 100 volunteers showed up to build the new playground in Van Buren Park. It was a long day. By the end of it, the number of volunteers had dwindled to about 20. But when it was all done - the volunteers and Parks staff sighed in relief that this 4 month project was completed. The children of Van Buren Township and surrounding communities now have an exciting new "toy" to play on when visiting Van Buren Park.

For four months, the Parks and Recreation Department had been anticipating this day. Planning consisted of determining which structure would

best keep the natural feel in Van Buren Park, recruiting volunteers, soliciting community support and donations for food, beverages and tools.

We began the day at 7:00 a.m. unloading the equipment, followed by an orientation by the installation supervisors from KOMPAN (the company that manufactured the structure). The morning was spent digging and fine-tuning the holes for placement, as well as assembling pieces of the structure. After eating lunch provided by the Girl Scouts, it was back to work putting the structure in place. We then cemented the structure in and brought in the wood chips for the final touches. I'm happy to say that as of Monday, June 3rd the structure has been open for kids to play on.

It's official!!! Visteon has selected Van Buren as the location for their world headquarters and technology center. Visteon Village will be located on over 250 acres of land bounded by I-275 to the west, Tyler Road to the South, Hannan Road to the east and Ecorse Road to the north. Located on the property is a former quarry, known today as Grace Lake. Visteon plans to locate their facilities in proximity to the lake and is planning to include other amenities such as shops and athletic fields. Pledging to be a good corporate neighbor, Visteon demonstrated their commitment to Van Buren when 25 Visteon volunteers helped in the Playscape Build held at Van Buren Park on June 1.

While many of you have expressed your approval of the Visteon headquarters moving to our community, some of you have also voiced concerns about matters such as increased traffic and congestion in that area of the township. Planning staff, our professional planners, the Planning Commission and the company have been working hard to address the changes this development will have on our community. We do understand that there may be up to 4,000 additional vehicles traveling through the community during the day and we, too, do not want anyone to be inconvenienced or otherwise negatively impacted. We also believe there will be many positive outcomes directly related to Visteon that will come to fruition.

Saturday, June 1 was sunny and warm, perfect weather to spend the day outside building Van Buren Park's new playscape. In addition to Visteon volunteers, the Girl Scouts donated their time and provided lunch to the workers. Clerk Payne, Deputy Clerk Cline, Director Elg, Detective Keele, recreation staff and a host of residents got in the dirt (and dust), tanned (or burnt) and helped build a recreational feature that should be enjoyed by our youth for many years to

come. If you volunteered, know that you saved your community about \$15,000 in labor costs to build this playscape. If you run into Director Ross or Parks Manager Camis, give them a pat on the back for dreaming up such a great community activity.

At Township Hall, we are busy working on next year's budget, a process about six months in the making. The Board will conduct Budget Preparation Meetings August 27-29 in the Otisville/Sheldon Conference Room. These meetings are open to the public and afford the Board an opportunity to meet informally with department directors to discuss their financial requests for the next fiscal year. Department Directors will advise as to the current status of capital projects, staffing and equipment/facility needs and propose new projects or services during this time. The Board will work hard to continue upon a level of cost effective public service while managing your tax dollar. Upon the conclusion of these budget preparation meetings, the department directors and Board will spend the next two months fine-tuning the proposals with a balanced budget to be formally acted upon no later than November 1, 2002.

One cannot ignore the flurry of development that continues to occur throughout the township. In the past few months any number of articles have appeared in various newspapers highlighting the development in Van Buren. We are on the map. The pace of activity remains quite a challenge and not without "growing pains." Staff realizes this activity is a challenge for our residents too and is working hard to ensure roads are kept free of debris and ordinances are being followed. We do appreciate all of you who demonstrate daily acts of good neighborliness and patience for our efforts to ensure this is a good place to call home.

Are you aware the Board recently enacted an ordinance that permits adoptions of dogs and cats from our animal shelter? This change from past practice allows for animals to be adopted after being kept for a period to allow the return to its rightful owner, but prior to being sent to the local humane society. If you're looking for a family pet, keep us in mind.

If you have a free moment some Wednesday evening, stop by Van Buren Park and enjoy a concert - music will be held in the park every Wednesday during the summer months.

Welcome to Elections 2002. The final challenge in federal district court pertaining to the new redistricting plan has been dismissed and unless addressed by higher federal courts the districts are now "set". This means all residents in Van Buren Township will be receiving a new voter identification card with the new districts listed along with polling locations. The redistricting plan has changed Van Buren Township from the 13th US Congressional District to the newly created 11th US Congressional District which is made up of the following townships: Commerce, Highland, Lyon, Milford, Novi, White Lake, Canton, Northville, Plymouth, Redford, Van Buren and part of Waterford Township; and the cities of Northville, Novi, South Lyon, Walled Lake, Wixom, Belleville, Garden City, Livonia, Northville, Plymouth, Wayne, Westland and part of Dearborn Heights. Our State Representative District remains 21, and is comprised of Van Buren and Canton Townships. In addition, our State Senate District has changed from the 8th to the 7th District, which is now made up of Brownstown, Canton, Grosse Ile, Huron, Northville, Plymouth, Sumpter and Van Buren Townships. Also included are the cities of Belleville, Flat Rock, Gibralter, Plymouth, Rockwood, Trenton, Woodhaven and part of the City of Northville.

In a previous *Lake Ledger* I reported on Public Act 269 of 2001, which went into effect on March 22, 2002. One of the provisions of this new law called for the elimination of straight party voting in our state. Petitions for a referendum election to reject Public Act 269 of 2001, which amended and added provisions to the Michigan Election Law to terminate the right of voters to choose to vote a straight political party ticket by a single selection on the ballot were collected and submitted to the State Elections Bureau. There were enough signatures collected and certified to place this issue on the November ballot. This means that a particular portion of the law is held in abeyance until the voters decide in November. In addition, it means voters will have straight party voting in the November election.

Changes and improvements continue to be made to the Qualified Voter File, which is the computer database system used

throughout the State of Michigan. The Qualified Voter File ties voter information to the driver's license file. A change to one system prompts a change to the other. For instance, if you change your driver's license address or name it will also change that same information in the voter registration file.

In other Township news volunteers built a new play structure at Van Buren Park on June 1st. It was a wonderful experience for all involved and provided everyone a chance to make a difference in their community. The day was hot, the water and soda plentiful for a group of hard workers. There was a wonderful sense of pride in working together for a common goal. My appreciation to everyone who participated on this project. AN ADDITION TO THE DEPARTMENTS OF DEVELOPMENT AND PUBLIC SAFETY

In a joint program the Departments of Public Safety and Development have hired Ms. Casper to work for both Departments. This joint venture is in response to a need in both areas.

NEW ENVIRONMENTAL DIRECTOR TAKES THE HELM

Hello, and thank you for the opportunity to serve as your new Environmental Director. To provide you some insight into my background, I would like to present a short personal and professional history. I grew up in northeast Michigan (Alpena) on the shores of Lake Huron. I believe that is where my commitment to protection of natural resources began. My job was at a local marina, where I developed a love for still take every opportunity to get out sailing, wand or fishing.

I traveled to Miami University (Ohio) to attend school and obtained my Bachelor of Arts degree in Zoology. After returning to Michigan, I decided to attend graduate school at Central Michigan University. I am in the process of completing a Master of Science degree in Biology, with a thesis project in freshwater ecology. My first job out of school was with a private consultant, as an environmental inspector. My main job responsibility was overseeing construction contractors to ensure they met their environmental permit responsibilities. This job took me to different areas around the country, including Iowa and Alabama.

Tiring of the traveling lifestyle, I applied for and received a position as Environmental Planner at the Toledo Metropolitan Area Council of Governments (TMACOG). This is the Toledo area's equivalent of SEMCOG. However, after spending almost three years at TMACOG, I felt a yearning to return to my home state of Michigan. When I discovered Van Buren Township, I knew this was a community that I could call home. I am eager to help the Township meet your environmental goals into the future.

My first week in Van Buren Township, I discovered how blessed this community is with natural amenities. Belleville Lake is a spectacular centerpiece for the community. The scenic and recreational opportunities the lake provides are

tremendous. Van Buren Park, on the shores of the lake, makes available large open spaces and facilities to the community. Van Buren also has the added benefit of the Lower Huron Metropark, which affords still more opportunities for residents to enjoy the out-of-doors. I have yet to discover and explore the numerous small parks and athletic fields available to the public. In addition, this short iteration does not even touch on the valuable natural resources that occur on private lands. On a short drive through the southern portion of the Township, I was delighted to discover many intact woodlands, streams with natural corridors, and open fields.

With the numerous natural amenities comes a responsibility to protect them for the current and future generations' continued enjoyment. Because of the Township's vicinity to large metropolitan areas and transportation corridors, the pressure for growth will continue to expand. While you must provide for the economic health of your community, you also need to make sure that the growth does not compromise your standard of living in the process. There are tools, such as zoning ordinances, which can help protect those natural features that you, as a community, deem important resources. As the Environmental Director for the Township, I hope to guide the development and implementation of these tools.

OPERATION DUTCHBOY



French Landing Dam

On May 6, 2002, Van Buren Officials and Public Safety personnel participated in an emergency management exercise titled "Operation Dutchboy". This exercise simulated the failure of our French Landing Dam and the negative effects to our township and our many neighbors downstream (South) of the dam. The exercise was coordinated by Wayne County Emergency Management and STS Hydropower (the Township's contractor hired to manage the dam). Some of the many agencies joining in the simulated emergency were Van Buren Public Safety, Wayne County Emergency Management, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), area Fire and Police Departments, Michigan State Police, utility companies, Army Corps of Engineers, Red Cross, Salvation Army, etc... Following a comprehensive evaluation of the exercise, FEMA rated it as strongly successful and valuable. This training was an important part of our ongoing process of protecting Van Buren residents (and those of surrounding communities) and minimizing the effects of any local/area emergency.

VAN BUREN DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY

Click it or Ticket is Michigan's ongoing enforcement and education campaign to encourage motorists to comply with the state's mandatory seat belt law. Click it or Ticket is part of the Drive Michigan Safety Task Force, a collaborative effort between Michigan State Police, sheriffs departments and local police agencies coordinated by the Office of Highway Safety Planning. The task force's goal is to reduce the number of injuries and fatalities in traffic crashes due to unbuckled motorists and impaired drivers through periodic steppedup traffic enforcement.

Recently over the Memorial Day weekend the Van Buren Township Department of Public Safety stepped up its enforcement efforts and issued over two hundred traffic tickets with almost 1/3 of them being for seatbelt violations. Forty-five (45) arrests were made for felony and misdemeanor offenses including arrests for Operating Under the Influence of Liquor.

Members of the Department of Public Safety are preparing to kickoff stepped up enforcement of the state's safety belt law once again for the July 4th holiday period.

Without periodic, stepped up enforcement campaigns, Michigan risks belt use sliding back to lower levels. The state's goal is to reach 90 percent belt use, like other states that have had standard enforcement laws for several years.

Michigan law requires:

- All front seat passengers to be buckled up.
- All passengers under the age 16 to be buckled up, in all seating positions.
- All children under age 4 to be in an approved child safety seat, in all seating positions.

Since Michigan's standard enforcement safety belt law took effect, belt use has jumped to 82.3 percent. It was 70 percent with the secondary law.

According to a recent review of crash statistics, Michigan recorded fewer traffic fatalities since 2000 which have been attributed to the seatbelt laws and increased enforcement of these laws.

Michigan's seatbelt law is a law that we can all LIVE with!

TRAINING AND TECHNOLOGY



Van Buren Fire Department's Thermal Imaging Camera

The Fire Department recently took delivery of a Thermal Imaging Camera (TIC) that was purchased through a Community Development Block Grant. This \$15,000.00 cameral utilizes the latest technology in thermal detection and will allow Van Buren's Fire Fighters to "see" inside a smoke-filled environment. With this tool, Fire Fighters are able to guickly and accurately perform search and rescue operations, detect fire/ heat advancement, and check for hidden fires within walls and attic spaces. At a recent live-fire training exercise, the camera accompanied the fire attack and rescue teams. Fire Fighters were able to clearly view the inside of the burning building where unaided vision (without the camera) was limited to several inches. This new Thermal Imaging Camera is merely one example of the sophisticated equipment used by your Fire Fighters on a daily basis. The combination of technology and countless hours of training are part of the Van Buren Fire Department's commitment to provide the finest services possible.

HOW TO STAY SAFE AROUND THE WATER

Every year thousands of Americans are injured -some fatally- in swimming and boating accidents.

Summer is here. In Michigan, you're never more than six miles from a large body of water. In Van Buren Township the distance is even less. Swimming and boating are great fun, but every year thousands of Americans are injured -some fatally- in water-related accidents.

You can help prevent accidents by following simple safety rules and learning to spot hazards. Check these tips drawn from the National Safety Council and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Swimming Safety:

- Never leave a young child alone in the water even a bathtub or wading pool. If you go answer the phone or get a towel, take the child with you.
- Be aware of pools in your neighborhood; your child could wander off and fall in.
- Enroll children older than age 3 in swimming lessons taught by qualified instructors.
- Teach children that they risk drowning when they overestimate their swimming ability or underestimate water depth. Don't overestimate your own swimming abilities, either.
- Take swimming lessons from a qualified instructor if you're not a competent swimmer.
- Don't swim if you've been drinking alcohol.
- Don't swim alone or allow others to do so.
- Get out of the water during thunderstorms.
- Check the water level before jumping in.

Boating Safety:

- Don't drink and boat. Alcohol is a factor in most boating accidents. Choose a designated driver.
- Insist everyone wear a Coast Guard-approved personal flotation device while on board.
- Pack Coast Guard-approved visual distress devices, such as flares, flags or lights.
- Check weather and water conditions before leaving shore.
- Don't carry more passengers than the boat's listed capacity.
- Use a third of your fuel to get where you want to go and a third to return. The other third is your reserve.
- Always tell someone where you'll be boating, when you expect to be back and what your boat looks like.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING SEWER BACKUPS OR BASEMENT FLOODING CLAIMS

A recently enacted Michigan statute, Act 222 Public Acts of 2001*, clarifies municipal liability for sewer backups. A key provision of the statute requires that a person seeking compensation for property damage or physical injury must file a written claim within 45 days of the event.

If you experience an overflow or backup of a sewage disposal system or storm water system, you must file a written claim with the Van Buren Township Clerk, within 45 days after the overflow or backup was discovered. Notice must be mailed to Van Buren Township Clerk, 46425 Tyler Road, Van Buren, MI 48111. Failure to provide the required notice will prevent recovery of damages.

Contact the Van Buren Water Department at (734) 699-8925 immediately upon discovery of an overflow or backup. Like you, the Water Department considers a sewer backup or basement flooding an emergency, and will respond to your call day or night, holidays and weekends.

THE WABASH DEPOT



The Wabash Railroad Exhibit at the Belleville Area Museum

In July of 1881, the Wabash Railroad ran its first train through Van Buren Township, and a depot was erected on Sumpter Road. From this time on the little village of Belleville became the commercial center of the township as hotels and shops grew up to serve the thriving railroad traffic. For many years, everything from mail to coffins arrived by rail, and convenient passenger service was available on both morning and afternoon trains. As auto and truck travel came to dominate the local economy, train service to Belleville stopped. The depot was torn down in 1968.

A small replica of the former Wabash Depot has recently been constructed on the second floor of the museum by volunteers Fred Hudson, Don Keene, Bob Anderson, and Neil Griffin. It displays a collection of railroad memorabilia including telegraph equipment, Wabash Railroad records, and the pocket watch which belonged to station agent Otto Fielder.

1860 WAYNE COUNTY MAP

Now prominently framed and on display in the museum is a five-by-five foot 1860 map of Wayne County. Manufactured in Philadelphia, the vintage map shows the city of Detroit as well as all the rural townships which were in existence at the time.

A treasure trove of historical information, the map also shows the locations of area farms and the names of those who owned them. It also contains several small inset maps, including one of the village of Belleville, as well as business directories listing area farmers including several in Van Buren Township.

The 1860 Wayne County map was donated several years ago to the Belleville Area Museum by former Belleville Mayor, the late Justin Emerson.

TAKING CARE OF BUSINESS

If you remember shopping at the stores which once lined Belleville's Main Street, be sure to visit the latest exhibit at the Belleville Area Museum. Entitled "Taking Care of Business," the exhibit features artifacts from old-time community businesses including restaurants, gas stations, funeral chapels, and hardware stores. Photographs of several long-vanished local businesses are on display throughout the museum.

Highlight of the display is a replica of a 1940's/1950's dime store. Items on exhibit include a collection of aprons, hand-kerchiefs, and ladies' gloves, children's toys, and old-time cleaning supplies, including Fels Naptha soap and laundry bluing. The dime store also includes a restaurant area complete with a jukebox! Museum visitors can even purchase some traditional five and ten cent items from a "sidewalk sale" in front of the dime store.

Featured in the exhibit are several items from Hamilton Hardware, a business operated by the Hamilton family from 1927 to 1986, as well as artifacts from the former medical practice of family physician Dr. Herbert Robb. The carriage and auto sales business of the Sumpter Randall family is also highlighted in the display.

The Belleville Area Museum is located at 405 Main Street in downtown Belleville. Admission is \$1.00 for adults and fifty cents for children. Hours are noon to 4:00 p.m., Tuesdays through Saturdays. The museum is closed holiday weekends.

HOW TO STAY SAFE AROUND THE WATER

Home - Pool Safety:

- Never leave a child alone in or near a swimming pool. Drowning is the leading cause of accidental death at home for children younger than 5.
- Don't assume your child can swim. Children can forget how to swim when panicked.
- Enclose your pool with a fence or other barrier at least 4 feet tall. Install self-latching gates that open outward.
- Keep the pool deck area clear of tripping hazards.
 use nonbreakable bottles and cans in this area.
- Discuss safety measures with guests before they swim. Make sure they know the pool's depth.
- Install a telephone in the pool area and post emergency numbers near it.
- Keep an eye on children and nonswimmers using inflatable devices. They could slide off and drown.
- Closely supervise children when they're diving or jumping in the pool.



Attention Mobile Home/Manufactured Home and Apartment residents:

If you wish to recycle, you may take your recyclables to the recycling center that is located at the Woodland Meadows landfill located on Van Born between Haggerty and Hannan Roads between the hours of 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 7:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m. on Saturday. Please be sure to have all your yard waste at the curb prior to the last week in November. Also, please be sure that all yard waste is properly set out at the curb tied and bundled, in the appropriate container, and properly labeled. (See guidelines on Page 19)

TRASH GUIDELINES

Homeowners of Brand New Homes:

Please call the Community Services Department to order your garbage container (toter) and recycle bin. You should receive them both within 2-3 weeks following your call.

Please use a 32 gallon or smaller container until you receive your toter. Boxes are not acceptable rubbish containers.

All Homeowners:

Your trash must be set out the night prior to pickup day. Waste Management starts rubbish removal early and there is not a set schedule for the starting point of each route. Trash that is missed due to late set out will not be picked up until the following week - **NO EXCEPTIONS!!**

Special Pickups:

Refrigerators, freezers, and air conditioners are the only items that need to be called in ahead of time for special pickups due to Freon. These items will be picked up by a different truck than the normal trash truck. Doors on refrigerators/freezers must be removed and the shelving units from inside must also be removed and properly disposed of in a rubbish container.

If you are Moving:

Please leave the container that was provided by Waste Management on the property for the next homeowners use.

Damaged Containers:

Broken or damaged containers supplied by Waste Mangement may be replaced or fixed if necessary. Please notify us if your container needs to be replaced or repaired.

Stolen Containers:

If your Waste Management Toter is stolen or missing, you will need to contact Waste Management at (734) 285-1579 to acquire a new one at a cost of \$75.00.

COMPOST GUIDELINES

Brush



Bundle all brush that is less than 6" in diameter. Bundles must not weigh more than 50 lbs. Bundles must be no longer than 4 feet in length and 18" around. Brush larger than 6" in diameter must still be bundled, however, it is considered trash and will be picked up as such.

If your trash, yard waste, or recycling is not picked up by 4:00 p.m. on your regularly scheduled day, please call (734) 699-8926.

Leaves and Grass Clippings



Leaves and grass clippings may either be placed in paper compost bags purchased at your local grocery store, or placed in a trash can with a compost sticker. Compost sticker must face the road.

Do not overload compost bags, and be sure to fold down the tops for easier lifting.

Do not use pastic bags!!

If you are using a can, it must have a yard waste sticker. Face the sticker towards the street and place the container 10 feet from your garbage. It should not be any larger that a 32 gallon can. 50 lb limit.

RECYCLE GUIDELINES

Paper



Newspapers: Including all inserts, advertisements, and magazines that are delivered with them.

White Paper: Incuding office paper, computer paper, and envelopes.

Brown Paper Bags: Keep them separate from your paper.

Tin

Tin Cans: Remove all labels and rinse them out before placing in bin.

Aluminum: Containers and foil.

Glass



Bottles and Jars: Any color except brown. You do not have to peel the labels off or remove the little plastic rings that remain from twist off caps. **Rinse and remove all caps.**

Plastic

Bottles and Containers: Must be marked on the bottom with a 1 or 2 symbol. Butter tubs and trays from microwaveable foods are not acceptable. **Rinse and remove all caps.**

Cardboard

Cardboard: All cardboard boxes must be broken down (including moving boxes) into 3'x 3' bundles. Cardboard boxes are not acceptable rubbish containers.
